Weather Update

The high pressure system out west moves out late this week as a cold front moves in from the north over the weekend cooling temperatures across California. A chance of showers are expected along the Central Coast as this system looks to develop into a cut-off low pressures system off the Southern California and Baja coast by early next week cooling temperatures and bringing a slight chance of rain to these regions. Increased moisture moves into Central Mexico with scattered showers and seasonal temperatures. A cold front moves through Florida Thursday into Friday with rain and thunderstorms across the state. A warming trend is then forecast into next week.



Market Alerts

Apples: Washington is still in a demand exceeds supplies situation for Granny-smith and golden delicious 100 size and smaller.

Broccoli: We are seeing another supply gap caused by previous weather in California. This is causing a much higher trend in the market.


Brussels Sprouts: We have seen a decrease in quality & supplies from Mexico. As a result the market is trending higher. We will see this trend well into next week.

Cauliflower: We are now seeing another supply gap from the previous weather we had in California. The market is trending much higher as a result.

Citrus (Lemons): Demand exceed supplies on 140s/165s/200s/235s all grades.

Citrus (Oranges): Demand is exceeding supplies on 113s/138s both grades.

Pears: Washington is extremely short of D'anjou 110s and smaller





Truckin' Along

California trucks have tightened up considerably since we have transitioned up to Salinas from Yuma. WA Apple trucks are steady as well. Idaho potato/onion trucks remain adequate. The National Average for diesel remained steady from last week and is currently at 2.583 per gallon. An increase of .317 from this time last year. California prices remained steady as well and are currently at 2.937 per gallon. Crude oil remained steady and is currently at 49.22 per barrel.

A Peek at Peak Seasons

Apples: Washington is still in the peak of its red delicious, golden delicious, Granny-smith, and Gala seasons.

Cucumbers (Eastern): Moving into peak availability next week.

Eggplant (Eastern): This commodity will move into peak availability in a week.

Pears: Washington is still in the peak of its D'anjou season.

Potatoes (colored): Bakersfield, California is in the peak of its colored potato season.

Squash (Eastern): Squash is moving to peak availability. Quality and supply should be very good this weekend.

Transitions & Temperatures

Apples: Michigan has finished with most varieties other than red delicious.

Bell Peppers (Eastern): Plant City has started shipping bell pepper with steady supplies of good product.

Berries (Blackberries): Salinas / Watsonville is expected to start in 2 weeks.

Berries (Blueberries): New California crop now available. North Carolina will start mid to late May. New Jersey is expected to start in June.

Berries (Raspberries): Salinas / Watsonville is expected to start harvest in 2 weeks.

Berries (Strawberries): Oxnard harvest will be winding down. Santa Maria will continue for another 6-8 weeks. Salinas harvest is increasing.

Cucumbers (Eastern): Starting to harvest cucumbers in Plant City. Light volume.

Eggplant (Eastern): South Florida is winding down and Plant City has started with light supplies.

Grapes (Green): The Mexican and domestic grown desert grapes are set to be available in the next week or two.

Grapes (Red): Mexico and domestic grapes are coming in the next week or two.

Melon (Cantaloupe): Domestic production has started with light volume in the desert this week.

Melon (Honeydew): Mexico has started and the production for domestic dews are set to start May 4th in a small way.

Pears: Washington will finish with red pears in the next couple weeks.

Potatoes (colored): South Florida is coming to the end of its season for all colors but the transition to North, Florida has been smooth.

Squash (Eastern): South Florida still has good supplies but the transition to the central part of the state has begun.

Stone Fruit: We are in the first week of harvesting stone fruit. All varieties will be available over the next week or 2. Cherries are available too.

Commodity Updates



APPLES

Washington - reds are steady on most sizes and they continue to produce mostly larger fruit. Smaller reds have been more available lately. Golden delicious are steady but strong due to light supplies esp. On the smaller sizes. Golden's are peaking on 72/80/88s. Granny-smith are steady to higher on all sizes due to strong demand and light supplies. The fruit is still peaking on 72/80/88's. The availability of 100s and smaller is extremely light! Most shippers are still subbing up in size and grade on anything smaller than a 72/80 and this will continue for the balance of the season. The Gala market is steady on all sizes. Galas are still peaking on 80/88/100/72s and they have better volume in the larger sizes. Fuji's are steady to higher on all sizes and are still peaking on 72/80/88s. Fuji supplies are light. Honeycrisp are steady to higher and they continue to peak on 80/88/100s. Expect the Honeycrisp market to remain very strong until they finish in early May. The quality has been good.

Michigan - Red Delicious are steady on all sizes and they will continue into mid to late June. Smaller fruit has been more available lately. Most other variety's have finished for the season or are close. The quality has been good.

New York - the Empire, McIntosh, Gala, and Red Rome markets are high and strong due to extremely light supplies. All of these variety's will finish in the next couple weeks. Red delicious are steady but strong and supplies are also light but they will go into June. Most of the remaining fruit is large. The quality has been good.

ASPARAGUS

Central Mexico is in production, but quality is fair due to the warm weather in the region. California is having good growing weather and is in full production. The market is stable with more regions in production. Washington state is also having good growing weather and the production is picking up. Peruvian production is picking up with better weather in both growing regions. Both growing regions are still seeing spreading and seeding in the tips due to warm weather over the last month.

AVOCADO (CALIFORNIA)

California harvest is 20 percent. Demand is very strong. Size peaking on 60s/70s and 48s and larger continues to be under-supplied for demand. Expecting to see better size come toward the end of May to the first part of June.

AVOCADO (MEXICAN)

Mexico shipments have fallen by 10 percent, but still is 74 percent of the market share of fruit in the US. Field pricing remain strong and expected to stay so. Mexico's volume will continue decline in the coming weeks, as their remaining crop will become less and less through the summer.

BELL PEPPERS (EASTERN)

The bell pepper market is very steady with signs of strengthening. Supplies in the southern region of Florida are winding down with only fair quality. Plant City is shipping steady volume of good quality product but acreage is down in the region because farmers did not want to take the risk after cheap markets this past fall. South Florida had a front move through the area this past weekend that may bring more quality issues to the product from the southeastern part of the state. Georgia will start with light supplies May 15th which means light supplies from the east for about 3 weeks. Look for fairly tight supplies for the next week.

BELL PEPPERS (WESTERN)

Green bell Pepper has dropped in supply, especially on number one large sizes. Prices is steady and will continue for the near future. Larger sizes on number one grade are limited. Colored Bells (Red, Yellow and Orange) has had an increase in supply, both blocky and elongated varieties. Good quality and condition will continue, supply will remain better for the near future. Market and demand are much easier. Packing 25# 15# and 11# units. Both number one and number two grade.



Commodity Updates



BERRIES (BLACKBERRIES)

Blackberry supplies continue to get worse. Southern California harvest continues to be minimal. Mexico production is very light and is approaching the end of the season. Quality on these late season berries is fair. Supply shortages will remain an issue until new California harvest begins. Salinas / Watsonville areas are expected to start with light volume in 2 weeks, then gradually build momentum as we move forward. If the weather cooperates, we anticipate to have good availability and excellent quality by mid to late May. Demand is very strong and market prices are firm.



BERRIES (BLUEBERRIES)

Blueberry supplies continue to improve. New California harvest is ramping up in the central valley. Quality and sizing is excellent. Market prices on the new crop are still high, but we expect to see them start to decline as harvest volumes increase. We continue to have consistent supplies of Mexican fruit in addition to the Georgia and Florida harvest. However, these areas are all starting to wind down. Georgia will last another 2-4 weeks, north Florida and Mexico will last another 3-5 weeks. Quality on Florida and Georgia fruit is very strong, Mexico is fair. Markets prices in these regions have started to decline with spot buy opportunities available. North Carolina is expected to start mid May followed by New Jersey crop in June.



BERRIES (RASPBERRIES)

Raspberry supplies remain consistent. Most of the volume continues to come from Mexico with some light harvest in Santa Maria. Salinas / Watsonville is expected to start harvest in the next 2 weeks. Once harvest begins, we expect supplies to improve and quality to be excellent. Markets have been firm and demand has been strong. We hope to see promotable volume by the end of May.



BERRIES (STRAWBERRIES)

We have excellent supplies of strawberries this week. The weather in all growing regions has been ideal. Production has increased and quality is being reported as very good in Salinas and Santa Maria. Salinas harvest is improving and volume is expected to continue to build as we move closer to the summer season. Santa Maria continues to have ample availability of high quality berries. Oxnard will continue to have fruit available this week, but is winding down quickly. Several shippers have already quit harvesting and the quality on the Oxnard fruit is not as strong as the other regions. Demand has been good, but supplies have been very heavy and the market has declined over the last week. As we enter the Mother's Day pull period, we can expect prices to climb slightly. We expect supplies to be excellent with spot buy opportunities available.



BROCCOLI

We are experiencing another supply gap. As acreage moved forward and demand fell, the market dropped dramatically. We are still not out of the woods so to speak. We are experiencing another gap from the weather we had previously. The market is trending higher and will do so into next week. Quality remains really good with decent crown size, minimal yellowing, and little dehydration.



BRUSSELS SPROUTS

We have seen a decrease in quality mainly due to the heat in the growing region of Mexico. This has caused a decrease in supplies. The market is also reacting with demand picking up. We will see limited supplies through next week.



CARROTS

Carrot supplies of jumbo, cello and value added product are very good and look continue to be so for a while.



Commodity Updates



CAULIFLOWER

The cauliflower market is on the rise. We are experiencing another supply gap from the previous weather we had in California. As acreage came forward the market crashed, but we are now trending much higher. Supplies will be limited into next week. The quality remain really nice with minimal yellowing and bruising.



CELERY

The celery market is on fire. Expect strong demand and light availability for the rest of the week. The southern California region will be hard pressed to keep production up to meet demand for the entire week. Production in Michigan and Salinas will not begin until June. Large sizing, twenty-four counts in particular have been the lightest in availability and this will continue throughout this week. There have been a few reports of insect damage and slight bowing. The overall quality, however has been good. Escalated pricing is in effect.



CHILI PEPPERS

Pablano - excellent size and Quality will continue with improved supply.

Tomatillo - much lighter supply and just fair quality, both peeled and husked. Sizing is only fair. Color and condition will continue to be only fair.

Jalapeño - good quality on new crop pepper, Excellent Size color and condition with huge supplies. Many number 2s are being shipped.

Anaheim - good quality, condition and size are expected to continue as supply have improved



CILANTRO

The cilantro market is trending lower as we have seen an increase in supplies from Mexico and Oxnard. The quality we have seen has been relatively nice. But we have seen occasional yellow to brown leaves upon arrival.



CITRUS (LEMONS)

Size growth to the lemon groves in California have left good volume of large size fruit 115s/95s/75s, but very limit supplies small fruit 140s/165s/200s. All shippers have reached demand. Demand exceed situation on small fruit 140s/165s/200s that will last through the summer. Look for very active and strong markets to continue through the summer.



CITRUS (LIMES)

Limes continue to peak on smaller sizes such as 230's and 250's while the larger sizes remain snug to unavailable. 110's through 175's are extremely tight with 110's being virtually unavailable. New crops limes are smaller in size and due to the lack of rain and hot temperatures they look to remain peaking on the small sizes for several weeks. Quality has been excellent on the limes over the past several weeks and looks to keep this trend. The market is currently steady on the smaller sizes and higher on the larger sizes.



CITRUS (ORANGES)

Export and domestic demand is remains very strong. Shippers will be done with Navels by mid May.. Size growth of the fruit has brought peak sizing up to 72/56 and the smaller sizes of 88s/113s/138s are extremely limited and we see the demand greatly out-pace supply for all 113s/ 138s of both fancy and choice grades. There limited amount of Valencia oranges being harvest by some growers, but no volume expected until more growers begin next week with more reporting they will hold off harvest until the end of the month.



Commodity Updates



CUCUMBERS (EASTERN)

The cucumber market in Florida is steady with a wide range in pricing between super selects and selects. With the wind Florida has endured during the growing season pack outs have not been very good. Growers are packing a low percentage of supers and a much higher percentage of selects. Light production has started in the central part of Florida with similar results, color and shelf life are good but most fruit is short with poor shape. Production is just starting and will pickup next week, as we get further in the season quality will get much better. Georgia will start light volume this week.



CUCUMBERS (WESTERN)

Improved supply on cucumber coming out of Mexico, Excellent color, quality and condition on all grades, sizes and pack styles. Supply will improve for the next week. Euro cucumber is also available with very heavy supply, #1 and #2 both single layer and bushel boxes.



EGGPLANT (EASTERN)

The eggplant market is steady in the mid-teens. The central region of Florida is just starting and production should pickup by this weekend. The first product is showing slight wind scar but overall quality is good and the scarring will clear up soon. There is still production in South Florida, volume is winding down and quality is very spotty. The weather in Florida and Georgia has been very nice, above average temperatures and sunny days will bring production and quality to top levels. The Plant City area will continue with steady supplies until the first week of June. We expect a steady market and good quality for the next couple of weeks.



EGGPLANT (WESTERN)

Good quality and condition with good size are currently being shipped from Nogales, mostly 18 count followed by 24 count are available as volume drops slightly. Many number 2s being shipped showing some scarring and occasional internal discoloration. Supply from Mexico will wind down and Coachella Valley will start shipping.



GRAPES (GREEN)

Green grapes have gone up in price. Supplies are lighter due to Chile ending their harvest. Problems continue to surface on a majority of the grapes ranging from decay to nesting which has created a short and high market. Shippers are having to re-pack nearly 100% of all green grapes. The Mexican and domestic grown desert grapes are set to be available in the next week or two. The market is steady to higher.



GRAPES (RED)

Red grapes are in a steady to higher market. Crimsons and some of the other red varieties are very nice and are definitely worth loading. Lower quality grapes have nearly all been shipped out. Growing conditions are good for producing high quality grapes and supplies are building gradually. Mexico and domestic grapes are coming in the next week or two.



GREEN ONIONS

We continue to see plenty of supplies from Mexico. The market is relatively flat. The quality has improved, although we have seen some arrivals with brown to yellow tops. But that is few and far between.



KALE

We have seen steady supplies of kale from all growing regions. The market is relatively flat but prices do vary depending on the loading location. The quality has been really nice with full green color, minimal yellowing, and full cartons.



Commodity Updates



LETTUCE ICEBERG

The demand for this commodity has finally subsided in the marketplace. Salinas production is very good. The weights have picked up as weather conditions have been ideal. There continues to be a few issues on quality. These issues include some light weights and pink ribbing. Santa Maria production has picked up as well. Shippers are listening to offers for volume type orders. Expect strong availability for the rest of the week.



LETTUCE LEAF

Supplies are stronger on romaine as well as all leaf items. The weights on romaine are averaging 32-35 pounds with 10-13 inches in length. Shippers are willing to make offers on large orders. Romaine hearts have strong availability. Green and red leaf will be in good supplies throughout the week. Defects on leaf that have been seen upon arrivals include seeders, discoloration, and mechanical damage. Santa Maria will have better production throughout the week.



MELON (CANTALOUPE)

Cantaloupes are increasing in volume over the next week or two. Demand has been pretty good for a while now and looks to possibly increase then taper off after schools get out towards the end of May and the beginning of June. Quality continues to be 95% excellent with a few problems such as softness showing up. We have good volume on 9's, 12's and 15's. The weather has been ideal for growing in all regions and this trend looks to continue. Mexico has started packing lopes and the desert has started with small volume. Offshore supplies are past their peak now. The market is currently lower.



MELON (HONEYDEW)

Honeydews are going sideways to down now. The overall supply situation has bumped up. Mexico has started with their honeydews and they are very nice too. Mexican dewes are peaking on 8's which has brought down the market to promotable levels. Quality has been very nice for offshore dewes with almost 99% of them arriving in excellent condition. Weather is ideal for growing honeydews in all areas. The market is lower to steady.



MELON (WATERMELON)

Quality and condition are much improved on conventional seedless. Personal seedless are available in limited supply peaking on smaller sizes. Sonora spring crop has started and volume has improved. Sugar has improved as weather continues to warm. Good demand on larger fruit. Mostly bins available and cartons being packed to order.



ONIONS

Northwest Storage Onions supplies are almost done for the season out of Idaho and will finish up next week. Quality is still good. Washington shippers will start finishing up the middle to end of May. Quality is still being reported as good. Texas growers have building supplies. Quality is being reported as fair. Texas should have good supplies for the next two weeks and then they will slowly wind down. Southern California onion supplies are going in full force with all colors and sizes. Quality is good. Market is steady to slightly weaker out of all areas.



PEARS

Washington - D'anjou pears are steady and still producing mostly US#1 80/90/100s. Small sizes remain very short and the quality has been good. Red pears are steady and they are still peaking on US#1 50-size half cartons but supplies are very light. The quality has been good.

Chile - Argentinian Bartletts are steady and remain large with 100-size and larger fruit only. Chilean Packhams are steady and they are heavier to larger fruit but all sizes are available on the west coast. Chilean Forelles are steady and they are still peaking on smaller fruit. The quality for all has been good.



PINEAPPLES

We are seeing better supplies coming from the tropics and expect to see good supplies through May and into June.



Commodity Updates



POTATOES

Market higher on carton 40-80 count with 90 count and smaller steady out of shipping points.. Demand on bales light with a weak market. Growers are in the process of planting next year storage crop which has been interrupted by rain and cool weather. The long range forecast is calling for warming weather which should growers getting everything planted. Quality out of Idaho is hit and miss. The main issue showing up is internal bruising with an occasional lot showing up with soft rot and light hollow heart. Shippers are slowing down and grading harder to keep these problems out of the box. Quality out of other areas (Washington, Colorado and Wisconsin) are being reported as good. Look for the market on the 40-80 count to continue to stay firm over the next couple of weeks.

POTATOES (COLORED)

Bakersfield, California - golds, whites, and reds are steady on all sizes and all are peaking on A size. Premium/Bakers as well as C-size remain short for all colors. The quality is good with minimal skinning but the availability has been lighter than demand. Production and packing are supposed to increase this week.

Phoenix, Arizona - red potatoes are steady but they are only offering A and B size cartons. The quality is good.

Idaho - old-crop red and gold potatoes are steady on all sizes but supplies are limited. The quality is fair to good.

North Dakota - old-crop red and gold potatoes are steady and both colors are still peaking on A size. Most shippers will flex to compete with other areas. The quality has been good.

South Florida - reds, whites, and golds are all peaking on A size and all are still producing mostly #1 product but supplies are light as the end of the season is coming soon. The quality has been good.

North, Florida - red, white, and gold potatoes are steady but supplies are still relatively light. All colors are peaking on A-size and the quality is good.

SQUASH (EASTERN)

The squash market on both colors is steady. Production continues to be good in Homestead and Immokalee with supplies starting in Plant City. More production from Mexico is keeping pressure on eastern markets. Plant City will continue to pick up in volume of good quality squash this week. Weather in the growing regions has been good with above average temperatures. The forecast for the coming week is very good and volume should pickup for this weekend. Quality on both colors has been good over all with a few scaring issues on yellow squash. The squash market should continue on a steady pace. Georgia is starting with light supplies of good quality squash, volume should continue to pick up over the next week.

SQUASH (WESTERN)

Yellow Squash and Italian Squash has transitioned to Sonora. The Quality has improve and supply has improved. Sizing is mostly medium followed by fancy and xfancy with some W/B being offered. Hard Squash is still being offered in good supply on Butternut followed by Spaghetti and Acorn. Very limited supply of Kabocha

STONE FRUIT

The import stone fruit season is finished. Weather in California's San Joaquin Valley has been positive for good production. The wet winter and plenty of cold nights has growers expecting a great CA stone fruit season. Stone Fruit harvesting has started slowly in the San Joaquin Valley. Some yellow nectarines and white peaches are being packed. Next week we will see more varieties available.



Commodity Updates



TOMATOES (EASTERN)

Gas green tomatoes are steady to lower next week. Roma tomatoes are also steady with a majority of supply coming from Mexico crossing Arizona and Texas borders. Grape tomato varieties are in good supply. There is not a tremendous supply of cherry tomatoes right now but demand is low and the market is steady. Quality is good and there are no immediate weather concerns in the forecast to cause a sudden reaction in the market.

TOMATOES (WESTERN)

Obregon, Mexico has increased production where supplies of roma tomatoes crossing into the US continue to be plentiful. Roma tomatoes continue to be heavily produced, with round and grape varieties increasing weekly. Further north to the coast, San Diego is also producing roma and grape tomatoes in limited volumes helping saturate the western marketplace. Next week markets are forecasted to be steady with plenty of fruit available until the Central Valley can begin in early July.
