CROP UPDATES

The West Coast is preparing for a series of powerful storm systems, triggered by subtropical moisture from the Pacific Ocean near Hawaii, causing substantial rainfall and strong winds to California, the Southwestern Desert, Baja and Northern Mexico, posing significant threats to crops. Read more

WEATHER

Arizona - This week's ideal growing conditions include showers on Thursday evening, slow harvest on Friday due to muddy fields, and partly cloudy skies after next week's rain.

<u>California</u> - Starting Wednesday night through the weekend, the recent warm weather will transition to intermittent rain.

Florida - Temperatures in central and southern Florida are expected to moderate, with highs in the mid-60s to mid-70s and lows in the upper 40s to upper 50s.

<u>Mexico</u> - Central Mexico fields are expected to experience normal temperatures and primarily dry weather.

FREIGHT

California is expected to experience incoming weather through February, potentially bringing snow to low-lying interstate passes and causing potential shipping delays.

The West Coast is bracing for a series of powerful storm systems set to impact the entire region beginning today and into late next week. These systems will tap into subtropical moisture from the Pacific Ocean stretching back near Hawaii creating an atmospheric river event (Pineapple Express) that will bring substantial rainfall and strong winds to California, the Southwestern Desert, Baja and Northern Mexico. The first system expected late Wednesday through Friday will be followed by a brief break over the weekend before the next stronger system expected early next week. Many crops will be in the line of fire across the Southwest as these systems roll through.

Citrus harvests in Central California will be delayed as the wet conditions will limit harvest crews' access to the groves. This rain may also increase the size structure of the remaining fruit on the trees, already very light on smaller sized fruit.

Strawberry fields in Southern California will see significant rainfall and possible flooding through early next week at a minimum. Baja will also likely see substantial precipitation especially to the north impacting production from this region.

Green onion harvests from Northern Mexico will again see a good shot of rain following last week's storms that will once again severely limit harvesting in the region.

The desert growing regions look to receive up to ½ inch with this first system late this week followed by a stronger, colder system early next week. These desert stands do not handle rain well and can take days to recover, not to mention delayed harvests in the wet conditions. The region has seen its share of inclement weather in the past couple of weeks. Previous very cold temperatures in the region caused widespread blistering and epidermal peeling in many leafy green stands. Add to this significant rain last week and vastly fluctuating temperatures recently. We will continue to see some epidermal peeling, and blistering with discoloration along the ribs of whole leaf items, especially romaine. With more rain on the way we will continue to see premature pinking in the iceberg, romaine and leafy green supplies. This condition many times is not evident at pack out and tends to show up during transit and storage. Processed leafy green items are in a similar position and will also likely see an increase in pinking showing up in the bag. As mentioned above pinking will not be evident during processing and tends to show up during storage.

The tender spring mix and baby leaf items will likely see an increase in yellowing and discoloration in upcoming supplies. Water saturation from excess precipitation will cause weaker texture in these crops which can result in increased mechanical damage during harvest and processing. While all tender leaf items will take a hit arugula is especially sensitive to these growing conditions.

It is important to keep your rotations in check moving forward as the shelf life of all products will be challenged. We will be watching these storm systems closely and will keep you up to date as to supplies and quality as we gather more information from the various regions.
