

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Asparagus sizing is tight on both coasts, with better availability on smaller sizes. Prices are rising as supplies remain limited. Peru faces slow growth from cool weather; Mexico is in transition, impacted by heat and rain. Tight supplies expected to continue.

Blackberries: Availability remains tight, but additional volume from Mexico and Oregon is expected to help ease the current shortage in the coming weeks.

Raspberries: Supplies from Central Mexico and Baja remain sporadic. Markets are expected to strengthen as demand increases with schools returning nationwide.

Strawberries: Salinas and Watsonville production is declining. Santa Maria has started, Oxnard in 2–3 weeks, but volumes won't offset losses until late August. Demand is rising, pushing prices higher.

Brussel Sprouts: Sprout supplies remain tight with high prices. Salinas production is slowly improving, but quality issues persist.

Lemons: Markets are strong with limited small sizes. Only District 2 is harvesting. Quality is fair; demand and lower imports keep prices elevated.

Limes: Prices are up on low yields and light TX crossings. Small limes tight; larger sizes more available. Higher prices expected through August.

Lettuce (Iceberg): Market is inconsistent with a \$5-\$6 price gap. Salinas weights up; market may soften. Some deals available, but value-added items remain escalated.

Pineapple: Crownless pineapples in high demand, low supply. Tariffs start 8/7/25. Storms in Costa Rica may affect orders.

Potatoes: Idaho 40–70 count tight through August; Burbanks available. Prices rising. New crop starts 8/11 with strong quality. WA new crop began 7/28.

Northwest Harvest Update:

Onion and potato harvests are underway in WA, OR, and ID with strong early volume and solid quality. Jumbo and colossal onions expected next week. Potatoes starting smaller but sizing is improving. Overall outlook is strong — now's a good time to plan ahead for fall. Read more

WEATHER

California: High pressure builds Wednesday, weakening the marine layer and warming inland temps. Lows in the mid-40s to upper 50s; highs range from mid-60s coastside to 102°F south of Soledad.

Mexico: Isolated showers
Wednesday, with scattered showers
and storms possible Thursday and
Friday. Brief break Saturday, then
more showers Sunday. Rainfall
mostly 0.05"–0.30", locally higher in
storms. Warm through Thursday
(highs upper 70s–80s), cooling
slightly Friday–Sunday. Lows in the
mid-50s to low 60s.

Florida: Weak flow Wednesday— Thursday will allow sea breezes to trigger showers and storms. A slowmoving front, fueled by offshore moisture, lingers through the weekend. Some tropical development is possible later in the week.

Arizona: Low desert temps will run well above normal this week under strong high pressure. Highs Wednesday: 112–115°F in Arizona valleys, 115–120°F in SE California. Phoenix may break its 114°F record. Lows rise from mid-70s to mid-80s by Thursday. Southerly winds increase to 20–25 mph gusts by Friday and Saturday mornings.

ALERT

Sizing remains tight on both coasts, with limited availability of Large, Extra Large, and Jumbo sizes. Smalls and Standards will be more readily available. Overall market prices are expected to rise due to limited supplies. In Peru, cooler weather is slowing growth, while Mexican production is in transition from Central Mexico to Baja and Guanajuato, impacted by heat and rain. Expect asparagus supplies to remain tight over the next couple of weeks.

Avocados

Markets on 48ct, 60ct, and 70ct are improving as the Flora Loca crop ramps up. Shippers are keeping Flora Loca and late Normal crop fruit separate. The Normal crop is nearly done, with Flora Loca taking over. Dry matter is in the low/mid-20s, so ripening will take a bit longer. Fruit is very clean with minimal #2s, typical for this time of year. California's season is slowing, expected to end in a few weeks. Offshore fruit continues arriving on both coasts but will taper off next month.



Quality is fair, with softer fruit and early decay typical for the season. Coastal winds and moisture affect fruit, but shippers are culling compromised lots. Markets are higher than last summer due to increased demand and lower imports.

CALIFORNIA

High pressure strengthens Wednesday, weakening the marine layer and warming temperatures—mainly inland. Morning lows range from mid-40s to upper 50s. Daytime highs will be mid-60s to low 70s at the coast, upper 70s to low 90s in coastal valleys, and mid-90s to 102 south of Soledad.



MEXICO

Isolated showers are expected Wednesday, with isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms possible Thursday into Friday. Rainfall totals will generally range from 0.05" to 0.30", with higher amounts possible in some thunderstorms. Saturday will see a lull in showers, followed by isolated to scattered showers again Sunday as moisture returns. Temperatures will be warm through Thursday, then slightly cooler Friday through Sunday. Highs will range from the upper 70s to upper 80s through Thursday, dropping to the low 70s to low 80s Friday through Sunday. Lows will stay in the mid-50s to low 60s over the weekend.



FLORIDA

From Wednesday into Thursday, weak synoptic flow will enable sea breeze circulations to produce showers and thunderstorms across the state. A slow-moving frontal boundary will linger through the weekend, fueled by moisture from a low-pressure system off the coast. There is also some potential for tropical development from this system later in the week.



ARIZONA

Temperatures across the low deserts will run well above normal this week under strengthening high pressure and low humidity. Highs are expected to reach 112-115°F in most Arizona valleys on Wednesday, with 115-120°F in southeast California. The greater Phoenix area may break its previous record of 114°F for the date on Wednesday. Morning lows will be in the mid-70s to low 80s Tuesday, warming to the low-mid 80s by Thursday. Light southerly winds Wednesday and Thursday will strengthen to gusts of 20-25 mph Friday and Saturday mornings.

Grop Undates

Harvest Heat Up in the Northwest

We're officially in the thick of the late summer harvest, and our Northwest staples are starting to take shape. Onions and potatoes are leading the charge, with growers reporting strong early starts and promising conditions across the region.

Onion harvest is ready to ramp up in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. Early loads out of the Northwest are coming in strong, with plenty of jumbo and colossal sizes expected to ship next week. Quality looks solid so far, and volume will steadily increase throughout the month. California's San Joaquin Valley and New Mexico are still shipping a good supply for the next few weeks, but both regions are beginning to wind down. Northwest onions are showing thinner skins at the start of the season. As curing progresses, we'll see those skins toughen up and quality improve from good to excellent.

Potato harvest is gaining momentum in Idaho, Colorado, and Washington. The early crop is leaning toward smaller sizes, but sizing should balance out as harvest continues. Quality is already looking better than last year. Some growers are keeping an eye out for hollow heart in later storage lots, which can develop after temperature swings. A bit of skinning is showing up in early russets, but that should fade as the crop sweats out excess moisture. It's also common to see a white blush or fuzz on new crop potatoes. This is just excess starch left behind from the sweating process, and it washes off easily without affecting quality.

All signs point to a strong start to August. We'll be keeping a close eye on sizing and weather as harvest continues into the fall. The outlook remains encouraging, and now is a good time to get ahead of fall demand and lock in your programs.
