

MARKET ALERTS

Citrus (Lemons): Markets remain strong overall, with 165 count and smaller sizes still slightly tight. District 1 (San Joaquin Valley) is nearing completion with about one week remaining, as District 2 (Ventura County/Oxnard) transitions into the primary growing region.

Grapes: Tropical Storm Alvin hit Sonora on May 31, causing a 35–50% loss in Flame grapes and delaying Green seedless harvest. Supply should improve through June, but pricing will stay firm until Bakersfield starts in early July.

CROP UPDATES

Eastern Pacific has 3 named storms and 2 likely forming near Southwestern Mexico. Alvin caused rain in Sonora; Barbra and Cosme stayed offshore. NOAA predicts a 90% chance of a new storm soon. No Atlantic storms this week, but warm waters suggest an above-average season with 13–19 named storms expected.

WEATHER

California: High pressure and a moderate marine layer will keep coastal temps near or slightly below average, with inland areas slightly above average through the weekend. Morning lows will be mid-40s to mid-50s, and highs range from mid-60s to mid-90s depending on location.

Mexico: Isolated to scattered showers and storms are expected through Friday, with 0.10"–0.35" of rain possible, higher in some areas. Showers will ease over the weekend. Highs will be mid-70s to mid-80s, lows upper 50s to mid-60s.

Florida: Warm, humid conditions with sea breezes will bring isolated to scattered showers and storms over the next few days, with rainfall of 0.05"–0.30" and higher in some areas. Winds may reach 20 mph in southeast Florida and Tampa Bay. Highs will range from mid-80s to mid-90s, lows in the low to upper 70s through Sunday.

Arizona: Coachella, Imperial Valleys, and Southwest Arizona will see above-average temps through Sunday, with highs reaching 110-116°F and morning lows in the 70s.

Berries (Blueberries)

California production is beginning to taper off as the Central Valley winds down for the season. In Georgia, output remains limited due to adverse weather and elevated temperatures. North Carolina has started harvesting, but growers are contending with multiple rain events impacting volume and consistency. The Pacific Northwest is still projected to begin at the end of June, weather permitting. Meanwhile, some West Coast shippers are experiencing supply gaps as the California season wraps up and the PNW season remains about three weeks out.

ALERT

Tropical Storm Alvin passed through the growing regions of Sonora on May 31st, dropping up to an inch of rain in some areas. The storm had a significant impact on the new crop Flames, which were set to begin harvest on Monday, June 2nd. Early estimates indicate a 35–50% loss in Flame volume due to severe damage. Green seedless grapes, already in tight supply, were further affected as harvest was delayed for three days, pushing availability even farther behind. Fortunately, the Greens did not suffer the same extent of damage as the Flames. Supply is expected to gradually improve throughout the month; however, market pricing is likely to remain firm until the Bakersfield harvest begins in the first week of July.

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

High pressure combined with a moderate marine layer will keep coastal temperatures near to slightly below average, while inland areas will experience near to slightly above average temperatures through the weekend. Morning lows will range from the mid-40s to mid-50s. Daytime highs are expected to be in the mid-60s to low 70s along the coast, mid-70s to low 80s in the coastal valleys, and from the low 80s up to mid-90s south of Soledad.



MEXICO

Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected through Friday, with rainfall totals ranging from 0.10" to 0.35" in most areas, though higher amounts are possible within some thunderstorms. Shower activity is likely to diminish over the weekend, becoming more isolated. Maximum temperatures will generally be in the mid-70s to mid-80s through the weekend, with lows mostly in the upper 50s to mid-60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Warm and humid conditions, combined with sea breeze circulations and daytime heating, will bring isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms over the next few days. Rainfall totals are expected to range from 0.05" to 0.30" in most showers, with higher amounts likely in some thunderstorms. Winds may occasionally reach near 20 mph across much of southeast Florida and the Tampa Bay area. Highs will be in the mid-80s to mid-90s across most locations through the weekend, with lows in the low to upper 70s through Sunday morning.



ARIZONA

Coachella and Imperial Valleys will experience temperatures about 5-10 degrees above seasonal averages through Friday, with further warming expected this weekend. Maximum temperatures are forecasted around 105-111°F through Friday, rising to 110-116°F by Sunday. Southwest Arizona will see highs in the 103-106°F range across most valleys through Friday afternoon, warming to 108-113°F by Sunday. Morning lows will remain in the low to mid-70s through Saturday, warming to the mid to upper 70s on Sunday.

Grop Updates

Tropical activity is on the rise in the Eastern Pacific with 3 named storms so far this year and 2 potential systems currently brewing off the coast of Southwestern Mexico. Tropical storm Alvin brought substantial precipitation to the growing regions of Sonora Mexico last week impacting grape harvests in the region. Alvin was followed by Barbra and Cosme, both storm systems remained offshore with no impact to Southwestern Mexico. The next system currently off the coast of Southern Mexico is given an 90% chance of formation in the next week by NOAA as a second low pressure disturbance is expected to gradually develop next week.



In the Atlantic basin tropical activity is not expected this week but warmer than average ocean temperatures in the Gulf as well as in the Caribbean in general are conducive to storm formation. The high heat content in the ocean provides more energy to fuel storm development. NOAA's outlook for the Atlantic hurricane season, which runs from June to November predicts an above normal season this year with between 13 and 19 named system forecast.
