#### **CROP UPDATES**

California's cherry crop is down to 4.6 million cartons due to bloom damage, while Washington's crop is strong at 21–22 million cartons with good quality expected. Melon production is ramping up in the Southwest as offshore and Mexican supplies decline, with stable volumes expected by June. Read more

#### **WEATHER**

California: The heat wave peaks Wednesday with gusts up to 40 mph. Coastal highs range from mid 60s to low 70s, inland up to 100. A low on Friday cools coastal valleys to the 70s; fields south of King City stay in the mid 80s. Temps warm again by the weekend.

Mexico: Scattered showers and storms continue through Thursday, then become more isolated into the weekend. Highs drop from mid 80s–90s on Wednesday to upper 70s–80s after. Lows range from low 60s to mid 60s over Central Mexico.

Florida: Warm temps persist in Florida through May 25, with highs in the upper 80s to mid 90s and lows in the mid 60s to mid 70s. Isolated showers midweek, mainly in southern areas. Gusty winds continue through Friday.

**Arizona:** Highs reach 100–110° in AZ and SE California Wednesday–Thursday. Slight cooling starts Friday, but temps stay above normal. Lows mostly in the 60s, with some low 70s.

#### **FREIGHT**

Freight is adjusting this week as we move past the DOT Blitz and approach the Memorial Day holiday. Expect changes in loading patterns due to Monday closures and the need to accommodate the holiday schedule.





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#### **Apples**

No surprises here-prices are steady, and the market's as unchanged as a vintage fruitcake. Foodservice sizes are plentiful, especially if you like your apples tennis-ball-sized. But Honeycrisp and Cosmic Crisp fans, brace yourselves: small sizes are scarce, and some shippers are calling it quits for the season.


#### **Celery**



# Weather Updates



### **CALIFORNIA**

The heat wave peaks on Wednesday, with afternoon wind gusts reaching up to 40 mph. Morning lows will range from the low 40s to low 50s, with daytime highs ranging from the mid 60s to low 70s along the coast, and upper 70s to 100 inland. A low pressure system passing to the north on Friday will deepen the marine layer, rapidly cooling coastal valley temps to the 70s, while fields south of King City and Lockwood stay in the mid 80s. Temps will warm again over the weekend.



### **MEXICO**

Isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected through Thursday, with more isolated activity from Friday to Sunday. Highs will reach the mid 80s to mid 90s on Wednesday, then drop to the upper 70s to upper 80s from Thursday through Sunday. Morning lows will be in the low 60s to near 70 on Wednesday, and in the upper 50s to mid 60s from Thursday to Sunday across the fields of Central Mexico.



# **FLORIDA**

Warm temperatures will persist over the Florida peninsula through May 25th, with highs in the upper 80s to mid 90s throughout the weekend. Lows will range from the upper 60s to mid 70s on Wednesday morning, and mid 60s to mid 70s from Thursday to Saturday.

Isolated showers are expected Wednesday and Thursday as a cold front moves through, with northern Florida seeing diminishing chances, while southern Florida may experience a few isolated showers later in the week. Winds will gust at 20 to 25 mph over Tampa and 15 to 20 mph across most of southeast Florida through Friday.



## **ARIZONA**

High temperatures will peak in the 100-105 range over southwest and central Arizona, and 105-110 in southeast California on Wednesday and Thursday, driven by a strong high-pressure ridge. Slight cooling is expected starting Friday into the weekend, but temps will remain above normal overall. Morning lows will be in the 60s across most fields, with some isolated areas in the low 70s.



# Prop Updates

The California cherry crop estimate has been lowered to approximately 4.6 million cartons, down from the 7-8 million projections to begin the season. Rain during the bloom has caused extensive damage to the fruit lowering yields. The lighter crop will support demand until the Washington cherry crop begins in early June.



Domestic melon production has begun in the Southwestern desert regions as the offshore season comes to an end with questionable quality. Mexican supplies are light as production transitions to the north. Domestic production will increase weekly as the weather warms with stable volumes expected by June. Sizing is primarily 9s and 12s with no jumbos on this early fruit with brix reported in 12-13% range. Production from the main "Westside" growing region of the San Joaquin Valley is slated to begin in early July.
