

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Peru delays create oversupply, pushing down small/standard sizes. Northern harvests rise; Mexico/Baja heavy on smalls. Supplies tighten ahead of January Caborca start.

Brussel Sprouts: Brussels sprouts remain very limited; Salinas and Oxnard face pests, decay, and small sizing.

Cauliflower: Supplies limited but gradually improving.

Cantaloupe: Westside deal ends; offshore fruit starts. Domestic cantaloupes pricey and small due to rain, with sizing and cosmetic issues.

Grapes: Grape market strengthening; greens tightening faster than reds. Peruvian imports increasing late Novearly Dec.

Lettuce (iceberg): Value-added lettuce remains highpriced amid limited supply and quality issues; production mainly in Huron, Yuma, and Salinas.

Lettuce Leaf: Lettuce supplies remain light, especially romaine hearts, with high prices and quality issues; production in Huron, Salinas, and Yuma.

Lettuce Tender Leaf: Supplies tight from insects and hail, limited through transition.

Strawberries: Short supply continues with steady demand. West Coast storm Thu–Sat may disrupt harvests; cleanup could last into next week. Central Mexico ramping up; Florida delayed, volume expected post-Thanksgiving.

Pineapple: Costa Rica storms limit pineapples through year-end; crownless in high demand. Prices rising, with possible substitutions and port delays.

Desert fields ramp up as West Coast storms slow packing. Early romaine/iceberg light but promising; spring mix, arugula tight. Strawberries at risk, melons finishing, offshore arrivals soon. Florida starting, Georgia winding down; supply improving but weather limits volume.

Navels are in full swing and remain the dominant variety. Markets are soft on smaller fruit, though rain this week and increasing retail activity may stabilize or slightly lift prices. Current peak sizes are 113ct, 88ct, and 138ct, with peak sizing expected to shift toward 72ct as the season progresses, tightening smaller sizes closer to December and January. Gas times are around 2 days, with brix levels at 11-12. Cooler nighttime temperatures have helped reduce gassing times.



Value-added lettuce continues to carry elevated pricing, expected to persist through the week, as demand exceeds supply. Current production is concentrated in Huron, Yuma, and Salinas, with minimal volume from southern California. Suppliers are facing quality and yield challenges, including light weights, rib discoloration, and misshapen heads. Carton weights range from 34 to 39 pounds, depending on the shipper and region.

Crownless pineapples remain in high demand. Expect substitutions, cancellations, and order changes. Pineapple prices will rise starting this week due to the holiday, with port delays potentially impacting loading schedules.

Weather Undates



CALIFORNIA

A low-pressure system moves in late Wednesday, bringing light to moderate showers mainly south of the region through Saturday, with totals around 1–2". Morning lows will range from the mid-40s to mid-50s, and daytime highs from the mid-50s to mid-70s. Friday night, skies clear slightly, allowing temps south of King City to drop to the low-mid 30s before warming through the weekend. Another system arrives Sunday, bringing additional shower chances into early next week.



MEXICO

Cooler temps with patchy frost are possible in higher elevations and wind-sheltered areas through Friday morning, though most areas should stay frost-free. Temperatures will moderate over the weekend, ending the frost risk. Lows will be mid-30s to mid-40s through Friday and low-40s to low-50s over the weekend, with highs in the low-70s to low-80s. Little to no rain is expected, aside from an isolated sprinkle or two.



FLORIDA

One more morning of icing is expected today, then warming temperatures should reduce the risk. Daytime highs will rise about 10°F by the weekend across most areas. Dry conditions are expected through Saturday, with isolated showers possible Sunday in northern Florida.

Northern Florida highs will be mid-upper 60s Wednesday, then mid-upper 70s Thursday through Sunday. Lows will be upper 20s to low 30s Wednesday morning, low-mid 40s Thursday-Friday, and mid 40s to low 50s over the weekend. Winds will gust around or below 15 mph through Friday.



ARIZONA

Today will be dry and warm, with morning lows in the mid-50s to low-60s and highs in the 80s. Latest models show a slower, wetter scenario with the approaching cut-off low. The system may stall over southern CA, delaying southeast CA rain until late Thursday evening, while central and southwest Arizona could see showers starting early Saturday. The low's center may not reach the state line until early Sunday, with showers tapering off by Sunday afternoon. Total rainfall is expected around 1-1.5".

Highs will cool to the upper 60s-low 70s Friday through the weekend, with lows dropping to the upper 40s-low 50s by Saturday.



Salinas season draws to a close this week with Yuma slated for 11/17 start. Expect Value Added suppliers to continue to fill the pipeline with product from the northern growing regions creating loading delays in Yuma. We are anticipating 48 hour dwell times in Yuma week of 11/17. Be prepared to wait for your product in Yuma. We are also expecting a very active truck market in Yuma this winter and are working on some creative ideas to circumvent the political setbacks affecting the truck market. Stay tuned for that or reach out to our team for more info for the time being.



Prop Updates

Holding the Line Through Transition

We've been talking about transition for weeks now, but it's becoming very real this week as the first desert fields start coming online just as the West Coast gets hit with its first true winter storm. Salinas, Santa Maria, and the San Joaquin Valley are all expected to receive measurable rain from Wednesday through Friday, with up to 2 inches in some areas. Crews have been doing their best to pack ahead, but the reality is that wet fields slow everything down.



Spring mix and baby leaf supplies have been inconsistent. Arugula is the tightest right now, especially after the storms earlier this month, but color and texture are improving in newer lots. Yields are still off, and no one has much extra to spare, but the bleeding has slowed.

Strawberries remain one of the toughest items out there. With a potential for up to 3.00 inches of rain this weekend, Santa Maria will likely be knocked out of production. Oxnard is hanging in with decent fruit, and Central Mexico is crossing a little more each week, just not fast enough to meet demand. Baja is still two weeks out. Additional weaker weather events on the forecast will continue to disrupt supply through Thanksgiving. Melons are almost done in the desert, with cantaloupe finishing up this week and honeydew expected to last a few more weeks. Offshore arrivals from Central America will start hitting Florida and the coasts over the next couple of weeks, but it'll be tight until they're fully in.

Back east, a hard freeze hit parts of North Carolina, Georgia, and North Florida. Most reports suggest damage was limited, but yields could still dip a bit in the weeks ahead. Florida has just started up, and with Georgia winding down, expect more pressure on the western supply as we move toward December.

This week marks a real turning point. The weather will continue to challenge the West Coast, but with the desert ramping up, every day we're seeing progress. It'll take a little more time for volume and weights to catch up, but we're heading in the right direction. Better days and better availability are just ahead.
