Commodity of the Month - Apples

MARKET ALERTS

Asparagus: Mexican and Peruvian asparagus supplies remain very tight, with quality and freight challenges. Improved availability is expected mid-to-late October.

Blackberry: Blackberry supplies are tight as California and Oregon finish, with Mexico expected to improve availability in 2 weeks.

Cauliflower: Remain very tight due to production gaps, pest pressure, and warm weather. The market is expected to stay firm.

Citrus (Oranges): California Valencia oranges are heavy to larger sizes, with 113/138ct very limited. Flexibility and substitutions to 88/72ct will be needed.

Green Onion: Baja supplies remain very tight due to heat and low yields, keeping markets firm. Supplies should improve by mid-to-late October.

Lettuce (Iceberg): Lower yields and INSV are keeping supplies tight, with quality issues and active demand pushing the market higher.

Lettuce Leaf: Leafy green supplies are improving as disease pressure eases. Romaine hearts remain steady, with prices in the mid-to-high teens.

Onions: Summer onions are finished; storage onions remain tight, with larger sizes and freight costs keeping the market firm.

Pineapple: Pineapple supplies are tightening, with crownless 8/10ct and organic remaining very limited. Crowned 6/7ct supplies are improving, with minor holiday port delays possible.

Potatoes: Burbank potatoes are finished; new crop has tight 40/70ct sizing. Washington quality is good, while sweet potato supplies remain limited.

Strawberries: Strawberry supplies remain extremely tight, with limited open-market fruit. Salinas and Watsonville are winding down, while Santa Maria improves into September.

CROP UPDATES

Idaho's 2026 potato crop is trending smaller than expected due to weather challenges, with early harvests peaking around 90ct and large 40/50ct potatoes especially limited. Yields are also down in some areas, keeping pressure on supplies. The full crop outlook should become clearer in late September as the main storage harvest begins, but larger sizes could remain a challenge through the fall. [Read more](#)

WEATHER

California: Cooler, below-average temperatures and morning drizzle are expected, with warmer conditions returning this weekend as high pressure builds.

Mexico: Scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected over the next five days, with cooler temperatures and highs in the 70s to near 80.

Florida: Showers and thunderstorms continue through the week, with heavier rain possible. Afternoon gusts may reach 15 mph. Tropical redevelopment is unlikely.

Arizona: Dry and cooler through Thursday, with showers and thunderstorms returning Thursday-Friday. Light rain is possible Saturday.

FREIGHT

Freight this week sees hints of fall markets showing up. Shipper delays and product availability is slowly starting to become a part of loading out west. As the days get shorter, we anticipate subtle changes in loading times, and that will affect transit. We are actively preparing for transition to the southern growing regions.

Apples

School demand and limited availability continue to put upward pressure on the apple market. Prices for Fuji, Pink Lady, Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, and Granny Smith have increased, with Fuji supplies expected to remain extremely limited over the next two weeks. Gala and Honeycrisp are the exceptions, as new-crop harvest is underway and the Gala market remains relatively steady.

Mexican asparagus supplies remain extremely limited, with Northern Baja providing the most consistent volume despite quality challenges. September is expected to be one of the toughest months for availability, with improved supplies not expected until mid-to-late October. Peruvian supplies also remain limited, with rising costs and El Niño uncertainty prompting major grower Olmos to exit production. Southern Peru continues to offer better quality, but strong European demand and high air freight costs are limiting U.S. availability.

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Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A trough over the West Coast will bring deep marine layer conditions, with spotty overnight and morning drizzle and temperatures near to below average. Morning lows will range from the low 40s to mid-50s, with daytime highs in the mid-to-upper 60s near the coast and low 70s to mid-80s inland. The trough will move east over the weekend as high pressure strengthens, allowing temperatures to warm closer to normal.



MEXICO

Isolated to scattered afternoon and evening showers and thunderstorms are expected over the next five days, with most areas receiving 0.05–0.30" of rain and locally higher amounts possible. Cooler temperatures are expected, with highs in the low 70s to near 80 through the weekend and lows in the low 50s to low 60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Sea-breeze and air-mass showers and thunderstorms will continue through midweek, followed by a short-wave trough later in the week that will keep rain chances elevated. A system that previously showed tropical characteristics could potentially redevelop, though this is not currently favored. Most showers will produce 0.05–0.30" of rain, with heavier amounts possible in thunderstorms. Afternoon wind gusts may reach around 15 mph across southeast Florida and the Tampa Bay area through midweek.



ARIZONA

Dry conditions with near-to-below-average temperatures are expected Wednesday through Thursday evening. Monsoonal showers and thunderstorms will return to central Arizona early Thursday, continuing through Friday afternoon. Light rain chances are also possible across much of Arizona and southeast California Saturday night.

Crop Updates



In Idaho, Size Matters

It feels like we haven't seen a "normal" Idaho potato market in several years. Extreme highs have been followed by extreme lows, and as growers begin the 2026 harvest, Idaho is once again walking on eggshells waiting to see what this crop ultimately puts into the cellar.

Early indications have not been encouraging. A cool spring slowed plant development, followed by periods of summer heat and warmer-than-normal nights that did not give the crop much opportunity to size. Early harvests are running smaller than expected, with grower reports showing very little product above 12 ounces and the crop currently peaking around 90-count. Large 40- and 50-count potatoes are expected to be especially scarce. Yields on some early acreage have been reported as much as 20% below last season, resulting in growers digging more acreage than originally planned to keep up with demand.

In a more typical year, harvest pressure often pushes FOBs lower after Labor Day before markets begin to firm again as harvest progresses and potatoes move into storage. This year, the concern is whether there will be enough large potatoes going into those cellars in the first place. We should have a much clearer picture later in September as the main storage harvest gets underway. Idaho's primary harvest traditionally runs through September and October, with the heaviest harvest period coming in late September and early October.





Crop Updates

There are also some normal new-crop characteristics customers may notice. Freshly harvested Russets have not had time to completely cure, so skinning or feathering can be more prevalent. Once potatoes enter storage, they go through a sweat and curing period as field heat leaves the tubers. During this time, suberization helps harvest wounds heal while the skin continues to mature and set. This is what eventually gives Idaho Russets the familiar, mature skin appearance we see throughout most of the year and helps the crop maintain quality in storage well into the following summer.

New crop also creates an interesting challenge with No. 2 potatoes. Russet Norkotahs, the primary early-season variety, commonly produce a high percentage of No. 1-grade potatoes. That can leave fewer true No. 2s available early in the season. With fewer No. 2s available, customers will often substitute into smaller 80- through 120-count No. 1 potatoes. In a crop already weighted toward smaller sizes, that additional demand puts even more pressure on the same portion of the crop.

For now, size is the story in Idaho. There are still a lot of potatoes left to harvest, and it is too early to judge the entire storage crop from these early fields. But if the current size profile follows growers into the main harvest, large cartons could remain one of the biggest challenges as we move through the fall and into the storage season.
