

MARKET ALERTS

Blackberries: The market remains tight with strong demand and limited supply, expected to last through early May. California starts mid-May, while Georgia is a few weeks out.

Blueberries: Central Mexico is winding down, and Peruvian imports are scarce. Georgia has just started with light volume. The market will stay tight until California ramps up in mid-May.

Raspberries: Central Mexico and Baja continue to produce only light volumes heading into May. California production is expected to begin mid to late May.

Brussels Sprouts: The sprout market is active, with low supply and strong demand pushing prices up. This trend is expected to continue for the next 2–3 weeks.

Citrus (Lemons): Markets are firming as rain boosts fruit sizing. Small sizes (140ct and down) are tightening and likely to stay limited until District 2 adds volume in June.

Citrus (Oranges): Markets are rising as navels wind down, with small fruit limited. Valencia harvests are set to start in early June to ensure fall supply.

Pineapple: Pineapple supply remains tight through late May, with peak volumes expected around the holidays. Costa Rica leads supply, focusing on contracts. Large crownless pineapples are limited due to weather. Mexican pineapples are available for TX loading.

CROP UPDATES

Spring temperature swings in coastal California are slowing broccoli growth and increasing mold and mildew risks. The purple cast on broccoli crowns is caused by cold weather affecting nitrogen management, not impacting quality, shelf life, or flavor. Cooking will remove the purple tint, and the broccoli remains safe and flavorful. Read more

WEATHER

California: Cool, marine-layer conditions continue through the week with isolated drizzle and temps below average. Skies clear and temps warm by Sunday.

Mexico: Warm and steady temps continue through the weekend, with a slight chance of light showers or isolated storms. Highs in the mid 80s–90s, lows in the 50s–60s.

Florida: Warm temperatures will last through April 27th, with light, isolated showers expected. Winds will gust 20–25 mph through Friday. Highs will range from the low 80s to low 90s, with lows in the mid 60s to mid 70s through Sunday morning.

Arizona: Temps will cool through the weekend as a northwest trough moves in. Highs will drop from the mid 80s–90s to mid 70s–80s by Sunday. Lows will range from mid 50s Wednesday to upper 40s–mid 50s by Sunday. Winds will shift to 20-25 mph gusts on Friday and Saturday.

<u>Pears</u>

Weather Updates



CALIFORNIA

A deep marine layer will bring near- to below-average temperatures through the end of the week. Morning lows will range from the low 30s to upper 30s south of King City, and from the low 40s to low 50s elsewhere. Daytime highs will be in the mid 50s to low 60s along the coast and mid 60s to mid 70s inland. The tail end of a low-pressure system will bring isolated showers Friday night into Saturday, though most fields will only experience marine layer drizzle. Rain totals should be under ½". Skies will clear by Sunday as high pressure returns, allowing temperatures to warm.



MEXICO

Warm temperatures will persist with little change over the next five days. A few light isolated showers or even a thunderstorm may occur through the weekend, with rain totals generally under 0.10", though higher amounts could come from thunderstorms. Expect highs in the mid 80s to mid 90s and lows in the low 50s to low 60s through Sunday morning.



FLORIDA

Warm temperatures will persist across the state through April 27th. Shower activity will be light and isolated over the next five days. Winds will gust between 20 to 25 mph during occasional afternoon gusts through Friday. Max temperatures will range from the low 80s to low 90s through Sunday, with lows in the mid 60s to mid 70s through Sunday morning.



ARIZONA

Temperatures will trend cooler through the weekend as a broad upper-level trough moves in from the northwest. Highs will drop from the mid 80s to low 90s on Wednesday and Thursday to the mid 70s to mid 80s by Sunday. Morning lows will be in the mid 50s for most fields on Wednesday, cooling to the upper 40s to mid 50s by Sunday. Light southerly winds on Wednesday and Thursday will shift to northwesterly gusts of 20-25 mph on Friday and Saturday.

Grop Updates

The roller coaster of temperatures, typical of spring, looks likely to continue across the coastal California fields as we move through April. As low pressure systems pass mainly to the north, they bring cooler temperatures along with a heavy marine layer and drizzle to the fields. The cooler temperatures will slow growth rates while increasing mold, mildew and disease pressure in these stands.

Broccoli production is currently showing some purple cast in the cold temperatures. Some customers have been inquiring about the cause of the purple cast on the crowns. Purpling can occur in broccoli under specific growing conditions. The Physiological explanation is the plant's management of nitrogen (fertilizer). There are a few things that can interfere with the plant's ability to manage internal nitrogen. Cold weather is the number one cause of purpling in broccoli. Extreme moisture and heat can also lead to purpling along with the lack or excess of available soil nitrogen. All of these conditions cause the enzymatic activity to slow down in the plant cell. The plants start to make red and yellow chlorophylls because they take less energy to produce. These chlorophylls are what give the plants their purple cast. The plant is simply being more efficient.

It is important to note that quality, shelf life and taste are not affected by this phenomenon. While cooking the bluish tint will fade and the broccoli will brighten with no impact on food safety or flavor.





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
